It sure was fun recently talking with the children of the church about Action Figures and Transformers. Their eyes brightened as we shared our understandings of the purpose, mechanics and names (Bumble Bee and Jesus) of their favorite Action Figures. Did they really get it--how Jesus was and is an action figure of love and that following his way transforms our world and us? Do any of us grasp the enormity of that concept?

The Apostle Paul gives us some help in this idea of transformation as we read his words to the young Roman church:

“Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God- what is good and acceptable and perfect.”
Romans 12:2.

Here’s a coincidence, scholars believe Paul wrote to that church about 25 years after Jesus’ resurrection. It seems we at CPC have a lot in common with the first growing churches of our faith! Think about it...at the age of 25 the Church was already undergoing tremendous pressures to conform to their present society along with equal pressures from the Holy Spirit to be Transformers fueled by Faith! Change, it seems, is inevitable for believers of every age.

CPC TO PARTICIPATE IN THE RED KETTLE CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

The Red Kettle Christmas Campaign enables the Army to provide food, toys and clothing to over 6 million people during the Christmas season and helps more than 34 million Americans recovering from all kinds of personal disasters nationwide.

The Red Kettle campaign, first started in San Francisco in 1891, has traditionally been The Salvation Army's most prominent fund-raiser. In 2004, the campaign raised over \$100 million in communities nationwide, with the nickels, dimes, quarters and dollars all remaining in the towns where the money was deposited into the kettles. The funds raised help support many of the 37 million people in poverty who turn to the Army for food and toys at Christmas, utility and homeless assistance, senior and child care, drug abuse treatment and many other social service needs.

CPC will assist in reaching these goals by ringing bells on Dec. 17 from 8-5 at HyVee South/Crossroads. All groups and individuals from the church are encouraged to sign up to ring. Denise has a portable CD player and Christmas music to sing along with to get everyone in the Christmas giving spirit. Traditionally our congregation has raised a significant amount of money for the Red Kettle Campaign during our shifts. Let's keep the spirit ringing! A sign-up sheet will be placed in the narthex soon.

TITHING IS NOT OUTDATED

Tithing—a dirty word? Oh, well, the text is from Deuteronomy (Deuteronomy 14:22-29) and that's in the Old Testament, so that doesn't really bind us anymore today. Anymore today. Right? Wrong! We have gone far beyond the limits of an agricultural society such as Israel was when these laws were handed down to the people. And yet—the basic reasons for these requirements remain valid even in our highly industrialized and computerized society. The Lord God is well aware of our very human limitations and reactions. Given anything at all, our first impulse is to keep it—every last speck of it! But, says God, "That's not fair. What about those who don't own land, who are disabled or blind or weak and unable to fend for themselves?" And, of course, they are part of our responsibility too. In the original context of this requirement to tithe, the idea was that, since God is the real owner of the land, it's only fair that He be given a percentage of the produce. Well, that sounds logical enough. And, in addition, the law given in Deuteronomy states very clearly the religious purposes of the tithe—to care for the Levites, so that they may put all their energies and time into serving in the sanctuary. But—and it's a very big BUT indeed—this wasn't the chief purpose of the tithe. The chief purpose was to teach the people the proper way to show reverence to the Lord. This wasn't to be a grudging "Well-if-I-have-to-I-have-to" sort of giving, but a joyous giving, a giving of all that we have, all that we are, in gratitude to God for the things that He has given so freely to us. No, tithing is not outdated, and it is not likely to become outdated in the future, unless human beings stop needing to express gratitude for God's great gifts to them.
