

Ministers to the world

Congregation Members

Grace to you and peace this morning as December dawns upon us.

Jesus words from last Sunday keep washing over me and I'm sure they will throughout Advent. ***"When you did it to the least of these, who are members of my family, you did it to me."*** We might call them people living on the edge, but he calls them brothers and sisters, members of his own family. (See Matthew 25.31-46--Bible Gateway is a great bible app that has lots of translations!) Will we take the time to care and share? As Pete Steinke says, would the poor write our church a letter of reference and recommendation?



I shared on Sunday that as I was writing my sermon, a few days before, I went out to get cough drops for my oldest son, Zac who had a bad cold. A man met me outside Walgreens, asking for a couple of bucks for a sandwich. He seemed a bit desperate, living on the edge, with a beat up bike and a beat up back pack... Definitely one of those Jesus would call the least of these... but I didn't really think about it at the time. But in the back of my head, wondered. *God are you testing me here?! Is the sermon you're about to preach in line with the life you live?*

I normally don't like to give out money, so I bought him a box of protein granola bars and large bottle of orange juice. I maybe spent \$7.00. I wasn't in the most graceful mood. I wasn't rude but I wasn't overly friendly either. I thought about it later that I didn't even ask his name... And then I went on with my day, to go to a few computer shops to see about estimates for fixing the church's laptop screen. I was looking for a better estimate than the \$700 one from Apple!

At the second to last place I went, a guy tipped the computer screen at an angle. "You might be able to get this fixed for free. Go to Team Tech and have them tell you for sure." My eyes got wider... **OK!** Sure enough he was right. I'm getting a brand new screen on the computer for free, a \$700 fix to keep the computer going for a while longer!

As I was driving home, I was unpacking the day's events and I couldn't help but think of weird and wild and wonderful connections between the two events. I realized that I had just received a \$700 gift. And just a few hours earlier I spent \$7.00. God blessed me (*and all of us, because it's your computer!*) 100 times over. I'm no prosperity gospel preacher, but God's math surprises me and you've shared stories like mine too. I've already been blessed 100 times over. I've got a job and a roof over my head. Opportunities abound... But Jesus wants my attention and wants to be a priority in my life. Will I let him? Will you? I'm certain he'll keep sending us members of his family to bless us and teach us.

Thank you for your generosity saints. Thank you for the ministry you are doing in our church and outside our church. I'm looking forward to spending Advent with you, as we prepare for Christ's Coming again and again.





Spotlight on Vera Atkinson and Family

Vera and her daughter Karen have been attending CPC ever since their Disciples of Christ Church closed a few years ago. Vera is active in PW and Bible Study, Karen was a member of the Book Discussion group until added responsibilities at her teaching job interfered, at least temporarily. Karen is teaching Family and Consumer Services (which we used to call Home Ec) at John Marshall. Her daughter Kara has a Law Degree and is a Law Clerk for Olmsted County. Vera lost her eldest daughter, Sheryl, a few years ago and has two other daughters; Teresa who lives in Iowa and is retired from working in the Business field was the first woman Optimist in Rochester. Carla, the youngest, holds a B.A. in Special Education and a Masters in Divinity. She is a behavior specialist in one of Rochester's two Autism schools.

Born on a farm in northeast Nebraska, Vera soon moved with her family to Eldorado Springs, Missouri, staying until her senior year in high school when they moved to Wichita, KS. After the small school in Eldorado Springs, Wichita's

senior class of 1000 overwhelmed Vera so that after three weeks she quit and went home to inform her parents that she had obtained a job at Woolworth. As they did not have high school degrees themselves, they did not protest.

Vera met Corky in Wichita on a blind date. He was a member of the Marine Corps and soon after they were married he shipped out for the Korean War. After the War, Corky took advantage of the G I Bill and attended Kansas State for an Electrical Engineering Degree. From there they came to IBM in Rochester. Vera decided to finish her education and got her GED followed by a Liberal Arts Degree at RCTC. She then found work as an operator with the telephone company where she ultimately worked for ten years plus five more years in their engineering department.

Typically IBM, the company moved the Atkinson family to Texas and three years later moved them back to Rochester. Before going to Texas they had lived in several rental quarters, so when they returned in 1983 they bought their lovely home with several wooded acres on Trapper Lane. Here Vera had a large garden which of course entailed a large amount of canning.

The Northwest part of Rochester did not have a Girl Scout Chapter, so Vera started one. She was the leader and Corky joined her in weekend camps. All the girls also attended church camp annually as well as a mission camp in Bowling Green, Kentucky, where they helped at a school, doing roofing, and painting, and general maintenance. The family as a whole was active beyond church work, Sheryl did a lot of canoeing on the St. Croix River, Karen hiked on Isle Royale, and at home the family played games and worked puzzles together, They also visited the grandparents in Missouri a couple of times a year.

Corky's job with IBM was in Development, so he was not allowed to tell anyone exactly what he was doing. After 29 years at IBM he retired. In his retirement he was instrumental with the Optimist club starting "Kans for Kids". In the last 11 years he was voted Cascade Township Supervisor for four consecutive terms. He died two years ago. He had done a lot with the girls and it was through Karen that Vera got him interested in the church. Karen refused to go to the church nursery. (It had a crib and she was afraid they would put her in it.) Corky took her to the preschool teacher and informed her that Karen was to be in her class now. The teacher wasn't so sure about this but Corky was firm and it worked fine. And Corky then began attending church with the family. All church work was important to Vera, giving a lot of time to Church Women United. After holding all their executive offices, she was presented The Valent Woman of the Year Award in 1998. Vera did a lot of baby-sitting over the years, so, in addition to her 4 girls, 7 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren she has one "great-grand friend," one of the children she baby-sat who has kept up with her over the years. That "great-grand friend" resides in California.

Struggling Maplewood church finds new life by living 'like you are dying'

Facing a slow death, the declining membership of Christ United Methodist Church in Maplewood gathered in 2015 to confront their future. The aging, mostly white congregation had shrunk to fewer than 100 members. The collection plate no longer covered a full-time pastor's salary. And it had tenuous connections to its neighborhood, now a mosaic of immigrant families of differing faiths.

"We gave up on survival," said the Rev. Rachael Warner, then a rookie pastor in her first assignment. "We decided if our church only had a few more years left, we wanted them to be years of full integrity — our values, lived out. We decided to let the Holy Spirit show us where to go and follow without reservation." Taking a line from country star Tim McGraw, they were going to "live like you were dying."

Church members breached the comfort of their own walls, offering their service at a school, a mosque and neighbors' homes. The church, located just south of Interstate 94 near McKnight Road, took Highwood Hills Elementary School under its wing. The St. Paul public school of 300 mostly immigrant children has no parent-teacher organization, so church members stepped in. They made and served meals to busy teachers during parent-teacher conferences. When the school designed a new logo and mascot, the church bought T-shirts for the students.

"That relationship surprised us, the way we were so embraced," said Kit Hoskin, church lay leader.

They bought a new rug for a classroom, provided food and beverages for family night and volunteered at school events. "I am very appreciative. They do a whole lot. They help teachers as well as the students," said Highland Hills Principal Fatima Lawson. "They are very open to anything the school needs."

The church opened its doors for a teacher training event. It's working with the school to establish a "peacemaker's program" and student award. And church members gave the school \$7,000 and wrote letters thanking teachers who work long hours. "They are on the front lines of the hard work of education and community building. We wanted to be present in our support and encouragement of them," Warner said.

Church members say they don't speak of their faith; they live it. "Our motivation for partnership is, it's part of our values," Warner said. "We all want our neighborhood to be safe and healthy. We all want our kids to grow up with dreams and the tools to achieve those dreams."

The church forged a bond with the Islamic Society of Woodbury, sharing meals and words of encouragement as it raises money for a permanent mosque. Church members fixed up the society's aging playground, threw open the gates and invited families. They also started a monthly community drop-in day and meal for neighborhood seniors.

What started as community outreach has breathed new life into the church.

"The one who gives up his life will find it," said Warner, paraphrasing scripture. The church is not out of the woods, but membership has grown a bit. Members can now afford a full-time pastor and those who do come are inspired by the new outreach mission. "We are starting to have new families come. We are starting to have baptisms and weddings. There is a feeling of hope and new life," Hoskin said.

Warner agrees. "We have really come alive," she said. "I hope other small churches look outside themselves, and see what God might be pushing them to be."
