
In October there will continue to be opportunities to give! We have a few months that need sponsors for our Compassion International child, Remberto. At \$38 per month, much care can be given!

## Letter to Sunday School Families

Welcome to this season of the church year, which began on June 11 (the week after Pentecost Sunday) and ends on November 26, the Sunday before Advent.

In October and November we move into the last half of the Season after Pentecost. During October, children will hear some of the foundational stories of our faith – from Exodus 17, 20, 32, and 33; and Deuteronomy 34 – about Moses and his leadership of the Hebrew people. In November, the children will hear three well-known parables from Jesus’ teachings, recorded in Matthew 25, about living in God’s way.

The sessions include time for children to read from Bibles and learn how to find the scripture focus passages. We are happy if your child would like to bring her or his own Bible from home. Variations in translations make the discussions more interesting and help point out to the group the different possibilities for translating from the original languages.

As we explore the biblical stories of faith, the children will also be invited to tell the stories of their own lives. Storytelling is important and through these stories children can begin to see how God works in their lives and the lives of others.


If possible, set aside time for storytelling in your own family. Invite your child to re-tell the stories explored at church, stories from their everyday lives. Tell your own stories too, and stories from your family history, seeing how the Spirit moves in the telling.

We will be praying for your child during these weeks. We ask that you and your child pray for us as well, as we prepare for and lead the sessions each week. May these months be ones of growth and discovery for your child and your family.

## MEMBERSHIP SPOTLIGHT

### Spotlight on Mark, Ivy, Roy, and Peggy Pillers

Two topics in particular need reporting about the Pillers family: 1) the ways in which the two families have developed over the years from the earliest citizens to the most recent, and 2) the number of mechanical engineers in one family. Ivy's citizenship dates back to the Brewster family who came over on the Mayflower --citizens from the beginning --while Mark's citizenship began as a first generation American, his mother being British. The Mechanical Engineering emphasis dates to Ivy's father Bill (Petersen) as well as her nephew and on Mark's side, a father, brother and two nephews. The list continues with their son Roy, working on his PhD in engineering now and daughter, Peggy who, after a few years as a dancer, hopes to become an engineer.



Mark and Ivy met on a blind date arranged by Mark's sister who worked in the same area as Ivy. The story is that when Mark came home that evening his mother asked how the date had gone, and his answer was simply **a big smile!** An aside from his mother-in-law (Margie) "Mark is very romantic and frequently brings Ivy flowers and jewelry." They were married in Portland where Mark was working for Hyster Fork Lift Co, They soon moved to Menlo Park, CA for Mark's work with Peterbilt and Ivy's residency in Radiation Oncology before moving to Rochester in 1991 for Ivy's first job, and her last, she says, at Mayo in Radiation Oncology. Crenlo was delighted to hire Mark as they were looking for a Professional Engineer. Four years ago on their 25th anniversary it occurred to them that they still had some of their wedding cake in the freezer, "and it was very good!"

To backtrack, Ivy was born in Cleveland, attended college in Marietta, Ohio, got her MD at the Medical College of Ohio in Toledo, did her internship in Portland and residency at Stanford.. Mark, born in Spokane, WA, got his engineering training at the University of Portland for both his undergraduate and master's degrees. It was in Portland that he met and married Ivy. Roy was born in Rochester in 1993, graduated summa cum laude from St. Thomas University in St. Paul in 2015 with a degree in mechanical engineering while keeping active on the swim team. He worked at Winona Lighting for nearly 2 years before starting his PhD at Iowa State this fall. Peggy, also born in Rochester in 1996, is currently at the Univ. of Arizona in Tucson with a double major in dance and mechanical engineering. She is fortunate to be able to visit with her grandmother in Mesa during the winters.

Beyond work, Mark enjoys pottery and woodworking. Ivy is active in the community, especially for the American Cancer Society Hope Lodge for which she was honored as an Amazing Woman in 2013. Swimming and Ultimate Frisbee are Roy's major extra-curricular activities as dance and music are for Peggy. The family likes travel and Mark also travels a lot in his work. When he returns from his trip to Brazil in a couple of weeks he will have logged over two million miles with Delta.

At CPC Mark has been on the Building and Grounds Committee (including a stint as chair) for six years. Ivy is chair of the Mission Committee and is a member of the choir. Roy's major contribution to the church was designing and helping to build the gazebo out by the garden. Peggy is an excellent pianist and plays for church when she is home from college. She has been playing for us since she was quite young.

The Pillers are a very talented and active family.


