

MUSINGS FROM PASTOR LAURENE



“The glory of God is the human person fully alive,” Irenaeus

This summer, the two sermon series have explored what it means to be fully awake and truly alive, and becoming wise. The wisdom shared from the two books which have guided our series has reminded us that life is always dynamic, changing all around us, sometimes within us and sometimes in spite of us. There is the ongoing invitation to experience the fullest of who God has created each of us to be, which perhaps implies this change. Each day, we are invited to experience the forgiveness of God and thus possibly experience a new way of living our lives and moving into to becoming the person we are created to be.

In *Fully Awake and Truly Alive*, Rev. Vennard acknowledges just how hard answering God’s invitation can be particularly because of the spoken and unspoken familial expectations, internal expectations, hopes and dreams and the reality of how life has shaped and impacted each person, for better and worse. Yet, the hope lies in our simple intention to be as fully present to God’s spirit as possible each day. Through the simple practices of graceful breathing, having gratitude for our own bodies, learning to silent the internal mind chatter and being willing to connect with ourselves, there is a healing that occurs. It is an opportunity to be fully present just as we are and to know that is good enough. It is out of that sense of being acceptable to God and ourselves that we can move into letting go of all those things, habits, perspectives and the such that keep us from God and one another. This becoming fully alive is a lifelong journey. Those who surround us in our daily lives and those we have encountered along the way have played an important role in shaping us. Perhaps our challenge is becoming more intentionally mindful how we are living so that we can hold onto that which is good and life giving in our lives and then let go of that which no longer serves us as we strive toward healthy life giving relationships.

Jon Kabat-Zinn, University of Massachusetts Medical School, said that *“The real practice is living your life as if it really matter from moment to moment. The real practice is life itself”* in a conversation with Krista Tippett. Becoming wise is about embracing all that life has taught us, learning to listen, critical think and learn from those people we encounter in our lives, and being willing to shift our perspectives as a result. All of which provides us with profound opportunities for growth. Becoming wise is about being intentional and thoughtful in how we approach life. Often, it is fairly easy to do, and yet, there are those times when the process of becoming wise is the result of a new awareness, which can be hard and painful. Life is always full of opportunities for personal and social growth.

In the midst of it all is resides hope. *“Hope is brokenhearted on the way to becoming wholehearted. Hope is a function of struggle.”* This hope is the foundation on which we live our lives as people of faith. Knowing that God’s always present hope enables us to live our lives boldly. It encourages us to follow God’s spirit as we seek to be fully alive. This hope empowers us through the great times as well as the challenging times. This hope reminds us that we need each other. Most importantly, this hope gives us the ability to pray, *“Now to God who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to God be the glory in the church and Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen.”* Ephesians 3:20. Life is quite a journey. Let us give thanks for all the ways God has and will continue to bless each one of us.

The Choir in Worship

This is a story about the church choir, but it's not a story only for present or potential choir members. It's a story for everyone who worships in a Church.

"Special thanks to the choir for beautifying our worship today." What a nice thing to say! Choir members are pleased when the pastor compliments them or, for that matter, when anyone finds their music to be beautiful. There is plenty of ugliness in our sinful world, and music in worship restores some of the beauty that was lost after the fall into sin.

But is adding beauty the primary objective of the church choir? Actually, the choir has other functions that are equally if not more important. The music of the choir should not be less than beautiful, but it should also be more.

When we gather for public worship, we worship our Savior God by proclaiming the good news about Jesus. This is the commission Jesus gave his people, and we show how much Jesus is worth to us when we carry out his commission. We cannot do all this work on our own, however; we call our pastor to proclaim the gospel on our behalf during public worship. But we do some of this work ourselves also in worship. When we confess our sins, when we speak the Creed, and when we sing Christian hymns, we are retelling the story of God's love.

The church choir assists both the pastor and the members as they proclaim the gospel in worship. The choir assists the members by supplying rehearsed voices to help worshipers sing new and difficult songs and hymns. The choir heightens the joy of hymn singing by offering special settings of stanzas on festival days. The choir assists the pastor, too. It enhances the Scripture readings as it adds beauty and variety to the psalms and scripture verses that punctuate the lessons. The choir often sings an anthem and, as it does, it proclaims the good news just as the pastor does in the sermons and the members do in their hymns. You'll often notice that the choir anthem invariably amplifies the worship theme of a particular Sunday as its text matches the focus of the lessons and sermon.

Have you noticed that the words the choir sings are [sometimes] found in the Sunday bulletin or in the hymnal? If the choir's only task were to beautify the service, the words would hardly be important. But the choir's ministry is more than that. The choir also proclaims the gospel and helps others to do so. In fact, that is the choir's primary purpose in worship. The next time you want to compliment a member of your church choir, why not say, "Thank you for helping me worship today and for strengthening my faith."



BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

Spotlight on the Kinion – Copeland Family

Bonnie Kinion was a PK--a preacher's kid-- which means that growing up she moved several times, mainly in Iowa. She was also a preacher's wife and when she and Wayne moved to Rochester in 2004 they joined CPC. A few years later Bonnie's daughter Carole and her husband Dave moved their membership here, and their son Ben later became a member by confirmation. Bonnie also has a son Paul who teaches Math at RCTC. Paul and his wife, Deah, live in Rochester. Carole and Dave have a second son, Daniel, in Oakland, California. Daniel is the national

wholesale sales manager for Chrome Industries. Bonnie and Wayne, licensed foster parents, had several high school foster children living with them from time to time.

Bonnie has held several positions in addition to being a minister's wife. In several churches she directed the choir, was soloist, and helped make choir robes for the children's choir. She liked being in the work force and among other jobs was an elementary teacher and worked for Honeywell, Toro, and Coast to Coast where she was a Systems Analyst. Thus, she is a great help to her computer-challenged friends. Bonnie, Carole and a Garden Committee began our Garden of Life – our Butterfly Garden--in memory of Wayne. Carole, a member of the Building & Grounds Committee, assists with the care of the gardens.

In fact, all three Copeland's play handbells together. Ben works each Saturday setting up the chairs for our Sunday service and is also on the Mission Committee. Dave is presently on the Nominating Committee.

Dave retired this past year from the U.S. Department of Agriculture where he helped farmers install soil conservation practices. He now works for the State of Minnesota as a Board Conservationist, covering 5 counties in Southeast Minnesota. Dave enjoys running as a hobby and is currently training to compete in his first marathon in October in the Twin Cities. Carole is a free-lance artist and, as professionals do, uses her whole name, Carole Kinion Copeland. You can see her work from time to time exhibited at Crossings at Carnegie in Zumbrota and in her home studio in Rochester. You may also find her fighting the woodchucks in her backyard garden. Carole works part time at Renning's Flowers as a sales clerk. Ben works at Sargent's Landscape Nursery. There he assists with the CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program. This is a service for people who like to eat fresh produce but do not want to grow it themselves. Ben grows the vegetables and boxes up whatever is "in" at the time. The people pay for 12 boxes a season, and pick up their boxes once a week. In the past Ben's hobby was making pottery. Ben, now a senior at Century H.S., was on the golf team as a junior and will play again his senior year. He was on the Century football team as a sophomore.

How did this all start? Carole and Dave met as college students in River Falls, Wisconsin. Carole was living in a cabin on the St. Croix river. This cabin had no running water and she heated with wood. One day, as Carole was hauling water from a friend's farmhouse nearby, she met Dave. And, as they say, "The rest is history."

Every day, we are witnesses to conflict. We read news stories of violence and supposedly irreparable divides. Angry rhetoric fills our airwaves, inboxes, and social media feeds. We see conflict tear apart communities, families, even people we know. Surrounded by this strife, it's easy to see the world through a dark lens of discord. We may even come to share the doubt expressed in Psalm 78:19: "Can God spread a table in the wilderness?"

Yet our faith tells us despite our doubts, sins, distrust, or even anger, God not only sets a table, but invites us to join it and partake in an abundance of peace.


